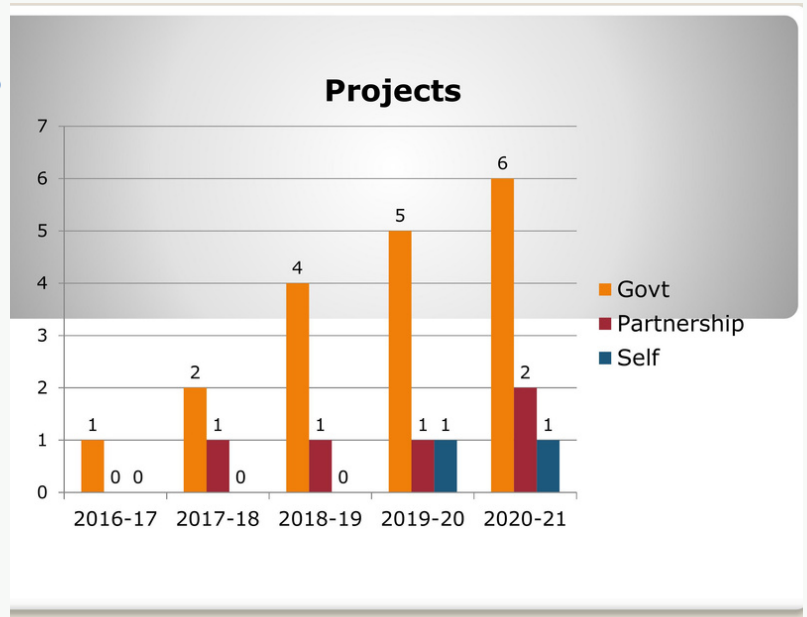

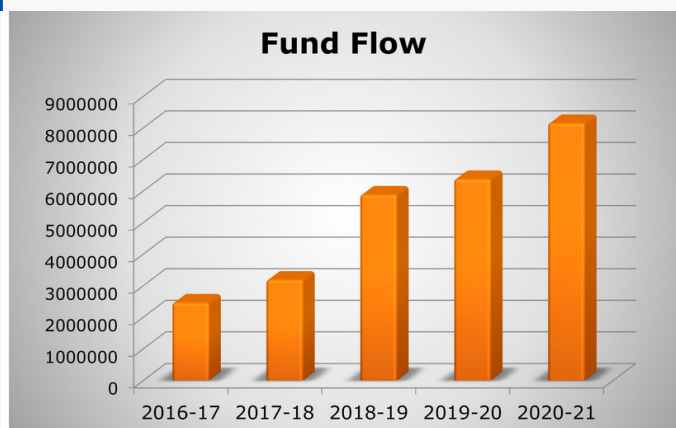

**CAPACITY INCREASED TO LEAD MORE NUMBER OF PROJECTS OVER 5 YEARS**



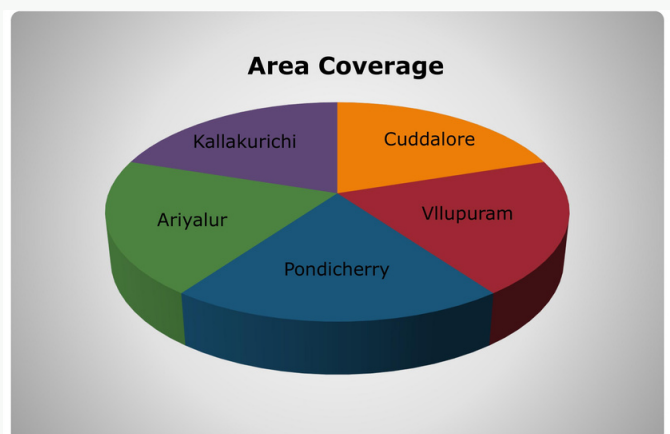

**ANNUAL INCOME AND EXPENDITURE INCREASED OVER 5 YEARS**



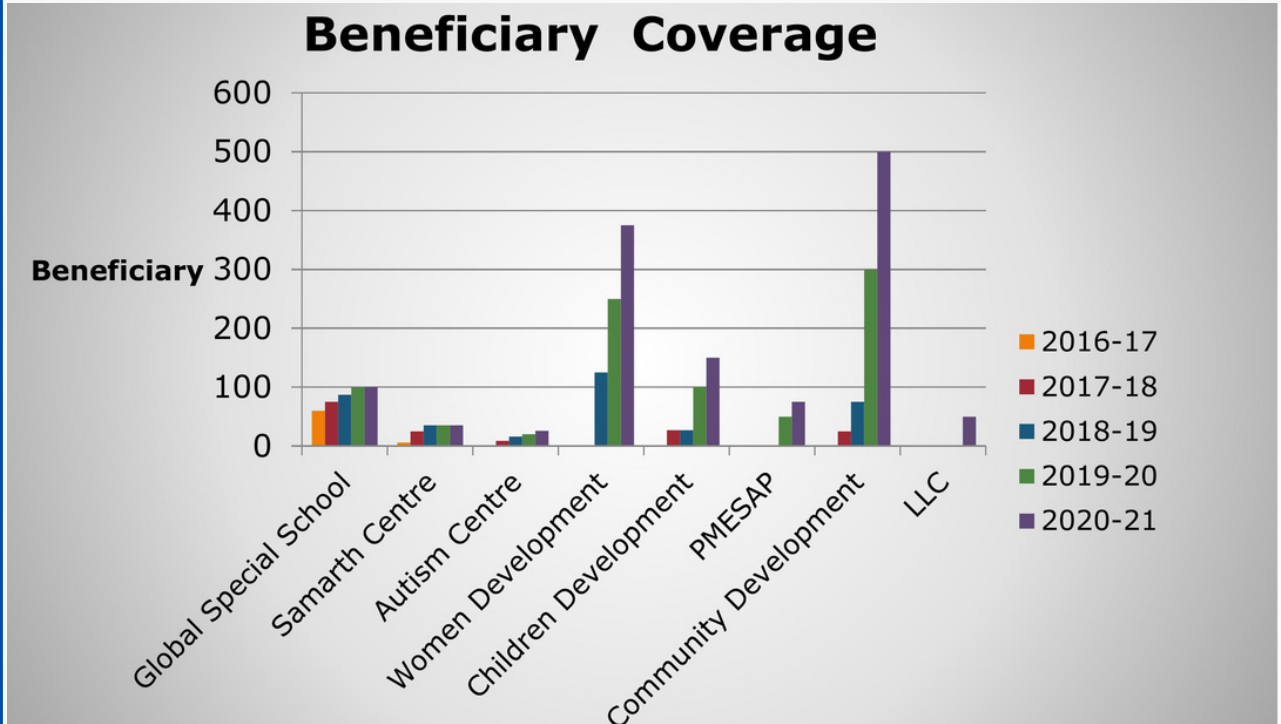

**SERVICE AREA INCREASED TO 5 DISTRICTS**



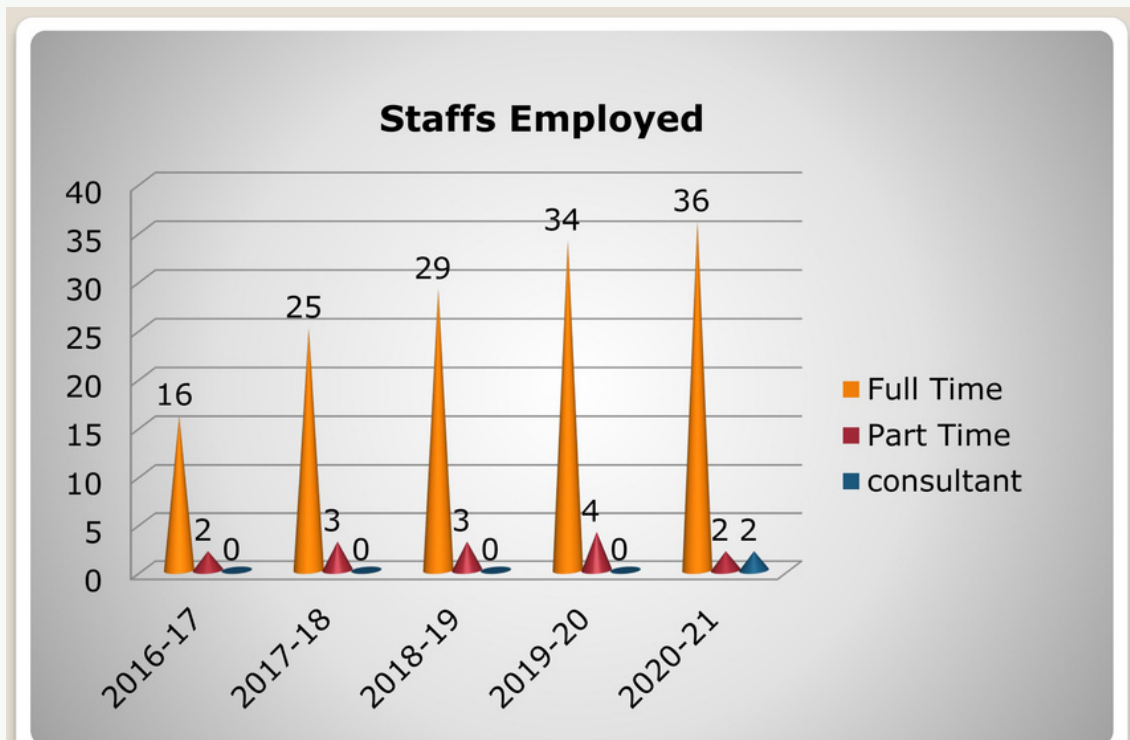

# SOCIAL SECTOR IN POST COVID-19 ERA



## CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITY

As the COVID-19 pandemic intensifies economic and social stress, as well as restrictions on movement and social distancing, a slew of issues are escalating exponentially. It has posed a number of new and unprecedented challenges to the non-profit sector in particular. Numerous NPOs are struggling with financial sustainability, panicking about transitioning to an all-virtual work environment, and are overburdened with projects that must be re-planned and re-scoped to address COVID-19 requirements or to accommodate constraints and changes to projects. Complete changes with innovative actions are needed to restructure the traditional approach to overcome this crisis. Appreciation too few organisations that they are encouraging their employees to pick up new skill sets, especially on fundraising. Here are few suggestions which learnt from our own experiences for sustainability

- We discussed our current requirements and implications for the medium- and long-term with funders in order to ensure that they are understood the present working situation of the organisation.
- We made good use of social media to develop and strengthen the positive impact on our organisation in the society, as well as to connect with funders and other partners.
- We prepared working plan for a post-COVID-19 world, including the development of updated strategies and operational priorities that are consistent with the "new normal"
- We developed technology and participating in the digital platforms to enable our service to reach the unreached.

We are developing strong networks of non-profit leaders in order to leverage partnerships and develop a unified voice, as well as to advocate for appropriate and effective support from the government, corporates,, foundations, and individual funders.

# RESPONSE IN COVID-19 PANDEMIC TIME

## Our commitment and responsibility

Almost the world was stagnant for more than one and half years without free movement by the people as the COVID-19 outbreak forced to impose endless closure of everything. The sudden lock down let people to face innumerable challenges to avail basic services including medical emergency and adequate food intakes.

As in the case of Persons with Disabilities, Women ,Children and Vulnerable they became as victims due to inaccessibility of life saver medicine, Education, Employment and social security schemes for certain period of time. More specifically the surge of second wave has given bad experiences as death toll was rapidly raised day by day due to speedy spread of Virus infection and non availability of on time medical service.

We believed that its our sole responsibility which is inevitable for social sector to intervene and partnering with government department to save people from the severity and should be given hands for rehabilitation. In collaboration with Health and sanitation

1. we involved into sensitize rural people about the COVID-19 virus and its nature to damage human community and also given picturised demo on universal safety measure protocol which needs to be followed by all to save our life from virus infection. The awareness campaign was conducted 5 location of our Women Leadership development Training conducted in Cuddalore District.

2. Kabasoora kudineer which is approved by the medical authority was provided to 2000 people in the project area.

3. With help of local authority we provided gray ration, Medical kit and other emergency items to 5400 PwD headed families.

4. Distributed Face mask, Sanitizer to frontline worker in and around of Cuddalore district.

5. Assisted to DDAWO, Cuddalore for reaching out social security benefits all PwDs across the district.





# SAFEGUARD MEASURE DURING THE LOCKDOWN

**Our Team at the doorsteps ... Parents felt the intervention has made their children emotionally free while the teacher play with them.**

The endless closures of Special Schools has created diversified problems to Children with Special Needs (CwSNs) and their Parents. The sudden interruption in providing life skills training and routine daily life activity orientation due to lockdown was vehemently affected CwSN's behaviour and their improvement has also deteriorated in big way.

On the other side the situation of parents was saddened as their income loss and their mental worries have forced them to forget the needs of Special kids. They opined that their children have lost all the improvements which have learnt at School and got exposure in unwanted incidents. They were unable to understand their children's psychological changes and how coping them.

By conceiving of all Global Special School has prepared a house visit chart to reach out all 60 special kids at their doorsteps. Special Educators, Physiotherapist have made a regular visit and based on the visit chart provided rehabilitation service to CwSNs and counselling support to their parents. In Addition to this we provided online special education and therapy intervention through activity videos, voice chatting and posting pictures. The effort has given a tangible outcome as the children were felt happy while our team visited their houses and the parents found that this was a way for giving solution to their children .

The team has observed that the children were underweight, improper medication and affected by health related issues. So we have taken remedial measure to recover our special kids from the above problems as they were supported with Life saver packs for last 10 months along with regular therapy intervention through house visits.

The life saver packs contains Gray ration, Groceries, Vegetables and snacks items along with TLM kits for month. Moreover the needy children who are affected by epilepsy have also supported with regular Medicine pack.





# CYCLONE RELIEF: A WAY FORWARD TO SAVE VULNERABLE & PWDS

Always Vulnerable are the prime victim for any kind of Disaster and their life has affected severely in many ways.

Cuddalore is one of the coastal area by which the district is prone to frequent cyclone and seasonal heavy rain fall. During the FY 2020-21 the district was heavily hit by Niver and Buravi cyclone and the people in many villages have lost their huts and belongings. A month long rain fall has affected their livelihood drastically. Moreover the resident of road side and promboke land dweller have lost their daily life and no place for sleeping.

We chose 15 severely affected villages in and around of Cuddalore district and they were supported with Cooked food, Gray ration and Tarpaulin sheets. Our support have saved 500 families.

In addition to this we have also supported 75 parents of Global Special School Children for taking care of the special kids. In this drive we have given priority for Vulnerable and PwDs headed families.





# BRINGING BACK TO LIVELIHOOD PANDEMIC BECAME A NEW OPPORTUNITY

What the pandemic impact on Livelihood is miserable to express that the millions of people in India have lost their jobs, salaries and stay at their home without income. As in the case of People with Disabilities is need not describe in a single word that they who are basically living dependent life for many things and severely affected as the yearlong lockdown has forced to cut their movements and they lost their livelihood.

IPromoting Micro-Enterprise for the Specially Abled People (PMESAP) by which the scheme is an offspring of COVID-19 aimed at supporting Disabled people to resume their livelihood activity at their locality, thereby ensuring them economically self reliant and giving a respectable life.

This initiative was started in 26th January 2021 on the celebration of our Republic Day and Jointly inaugurated by Thiru. Jegadeeswaran., Revenue Divisional Officer-RDO,Cuddalore and hiru.R.Balasundaran, District Differently Abled Welfare Officer-DDRO, Cuddalore.

The main aim of this initiative is to promote 500 PwDs as Micro Entrepreneur before end of 2025. From its inception we have supported 100 Disabled people for various livelihood activities.

The immediate outcome of the scheme is that the beneficiaries have been started to income generation through their livelihood activities.





# HIGHLIGHTS OF THE YEAR 2020-21





# 1.Special Education

As Special Education is closely involves in educating persons with special needs through individualized teaching procedures, adopted materials and equipment with accessible settings. But the lockdown lead school closure has highly impacted the special education system. Keeping of Social Distancing and other safety protocols blocked Special children to access such training .

We at Global special school by strictly adopting the safety protocol information planned to render education service in both Offline and Online ways.

we prepared a lesson plan for educating children who stayed in hostel to get aware of COVID-19 virus infection and the method of self protection to be followed by every one and they have been oriented regularly on this along life skill orientation. All of them have provided healthy

We also made regular house visit to 60 CwSNs to train their parents on child management skills along with rehabilitation intervention.





## 2.Awareness on COVID-19 safety measures

As everyone know that without making sensitization on COVID-19 and its impacts the combating of virus infection will be not in positive result as the stigma restrict people from follow the safety measures like wearing face mask, using sanitizer and hand washing. The people think that is not their responsibility and it completely relied on government duty. As a Voluntary organisation we have taken measure to spread the information about the pandemic and how it will affect their life especially Children with Special Needs.



An exclusive campaign on the challenges and solution for COVID-19 virus was conducted for creating awareness among the parents and public . In that event our special children demonstrated the way how the hands to be clean by soap, how to wear face mask and the usage of sanitizer. Through this campaign we tried to remove the stigma among the public and to create collective action for stopping the speed of virus spread. Moreover we also making still pictures on same thing to take this information to more number of people through social media.

### 3. Healthy Diet for Immunity

The immunity power is more essential to our body strength and it protect us from diseases like corona virus. But it seems to impossible to Disabled people due to their varied reasons as their disability nature and lack of availability of healthy diet are the main reasons.

As per the WHO information the possibility of COVID-19 virus infection is very low among those who are having good immunity in their health. So that they have instructed to have a balanced food habit to increase the immune power during this COVID-19 crises especially to Children and PwDs.

By following the above we had a formal discussion with medical doctors to know about the food chart which will help to increase the immune power of hostel inmates and action has also taken for providing regular balanced food provision to inmates. Priority has given for greens, fruits, dry nuts, eggs and chicken in their food menu.

Within this we also given most priority for girls children. The regular balanced food intakes and other hygenic practices no children have affected by the virus infection.







## 4. Vocational Skills

Promoting PwDs as a productive member is an inevitable and essential activity for building inclusive society. From this back drop Global home for Adult Girls with intellectually Disabled is a place for getting technical knowledge improvement through Vocational skills. Along with Vocational skills intensive care and support to have inclusive environment leading peaceful life is also provided to 40 inmates. Rehabilitation service, Psychological support intervention and Medical facility are given to ensure their healthy life.

Based on the IQ level test the training on Paper Cup Making, Artificial Jewelry Marking, Basket making and other crafts activities have been given with regular monitoring support.

Their produce is also displayed for sales for income generation activity. The girls felt happy while involving them into different activities and it also given enormous happiness, tension free life for them.





## 5.Samarth...A Home for Respite Care and Rehabilitation

The objective of SAMARTH Centre is to provide respite home residential facility for Orphan and abandoned Persons with Intellectual Disabilities (PwIDs) and their parents while in crises. They will be also provided age specific vocational training and inclusive education opportunity.

Even though the centre was under closure during the lockdown 20 inmates have stayed at the centre for their rehabilitation service. by following all the safety measures they were provided all kinds of therapeutical intervention along with pre vocational skills. The remaining 14 who were send back to their homes at the time of complete lockdown have also provided services through house visit made by Special Educator, Physiotherapy and Counsellor. Along with safety measures the action has taken for safeguard their parents by providing of food items,





## 6.Rebuilding initiative ... Coping Skills for Children in facing New Normal

Almost one and half years, Children are staying at homes due to school closure without seeing and learning the outer space dynamics physically except online classes. They are getting passes on their exams without meeting of their teachers and class friends.

Of course children are almost forgetting many things what they have learnt a lot through on the way to their school.

However, it is necessary to train children during this critical situation to cope up the pandemic impacts. In order to make children to be productive and vibrant, special efforts are needed to spend their time in constructive ways.

With this intention, we instigated to form Neighbourhood Children Parliament with an idea of making children to be aware of their environment with safe and get involve them to spend their time to promote their surroundings to be hygiene and clean along with their education.





## 7.Amid the Lock down...Women trained to instill their leadership skills



The leadership development of women is important element to fight against poverty reduction, economic growth and strengthening of civil society. Moreover it is very essential to educate women on the present crises of COVID-19 pandemic and its implication on women and children. The lockdown period has given more number of negative experiences for them and they have forced to suffer for many things. Keeping this in view the leadership development training which was sanctioned by the Ministry of Minority Affairs, Government of India was conducted in 5 locations during the FY 2020-21.

There were 125 women from minority communities have benefited from the training and they have also been provided hand holding support for reaching the training objective.

Women were oriented for getting knowledge on Violence against women, Legal rights for them, understanding on gender issues, the importance of health and hygiene of women, various welfare schemes, the need of Life skills development and economic empowerment. The resource persons of this training have been engaged from various discipline.



## 8. COVID-19 Vaccination: A Drive for combating Pandemic

Vaccination is the only weapon for combating COVID-19 but the hesitant behaviour among people has restricted to get vaccinated as they believed that the vaccination will lead negative impacts even though the government machinery given adequate clarification on the myths . So we understood the situation and involved into removing the existing hesitancy behaviour and dispel the myths of Vaccination. The awareness campaigns were conducted at different locations of Cuddalore district to cover all segments of women community. During the campaign we faced numerous challenges which linked to the aftermath of vaccination. Mostly on whether one can take vaccination while suffering with diseases like diabetes, Heart related diseases and thyroid problem. The attendees were particularly interested to know about the food habit after vaccination. Solutions have been given in appropriate manner with help of the guidelines given by the ICMR and through the Health Department.





## 9. Our Special Kids are first in COVID-19 Vaccination



*Be the example for good initiation is better than nothing...*

In wake of COVID-19 vaccination campaign the TamilNadu state government has given priority for PwDs to get vaccination at first. By using this opportunity the young Adults of Global Special School/ Home have come forward to get vaccinated while normal people have showed hesitancy. This has become a positive sign among the public to encourage PwDs and even normal people making awareness on vaccination.

The programme was inaugurated by the Hon'ble State minister for Agriculture **M.R.K Panneerselvam** and followed by this a special vaccination camps were also arranged for reaching all PwDs jointly with health department.





## 10 Right to Vote- Pledge on 100% voting by PwDs

It is our sole duty to ensure the right to vote for Persons with Disabilities because they are simply ignored to cost their vote due to their disability. In recent time they have also started to claim their rights to create accessible facilities to participate in the election. However still there is a lack of interest among PwDs to participate in electoral activities. To increase their participation in the last state assembly election SVAP campaign for 100% voting was conducted by the guidance of District Election officer/ District Collector and District Differently Abled Welfare officer.



## 11. Children through Neighbourhood Parliament

With the sudden shift away from the normal settings, the pandemic lead lockdown made Children to restrict at home, home violence, assisting in family members business or job, sexual abuse or spent time in unproductive way which leads them to more idle, stress and depression.

to reeover children from their severities, we formed Neighbourhood Children Parliament to provide psychological service to cope with critical situation and also make them as responsive children to the society.

Based on this we have reached out to 250 Children in 5 villages of Cuddalore Block between age group 6 to 17 years formed them as group for getting awareness on the present situation and the way for reviving their education.





## 11. Mental Health Awareness rally to Public

Mental health has come to prime focus in this pandemic time. People of all age groups and occupations has come across the effects of COVID-19 to normalized in new era of life. But fortunately 10th October of every is celebrated as World Mental Health Day and it gets popularity in this year since most of us have affected by lockdown lead impacts.

In this context, we have taken part in the event which was observed by the District Mental Health Programme of Cuddalore District. The programme was converted into "Awareness cycle rally" and it was inaugurated by the District Collector Thiru. Balasubramaniyan. Huge numbers of volunteers from colleges, hospitals, Non Governmental Organisation have participated in the rally and the message about the myth and reality of Mental Health disseminated through Awareness slogan.





## ACHIEVEMENT AND OUTCOME

Albeit the lockdown have affected the normal life of every one we as a nonprofit voluntary organisation has taken tireless effort to reach our project beneficiaries adopting all safety measures followed by the government guidance. During the FY 2020-21 we have faced many challenges while moving towards field but it was also given enormous faith to march towards our goal.

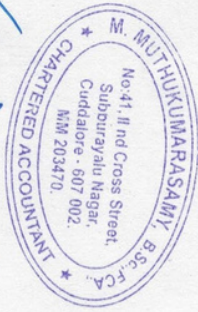
